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TUNING UP FOR A VERY MUSICAL MARCH

MARCH 21 – 23 will see an influx of musicians, instrument makers. suppliers tone-wood and visitors for Deloraine StringFest Tasmania.

Over the weekend there will be displays of beautiful hand-made stringed instruments crafted from Tasmanian timbers such as blackwood, sassafras, myrtle, Huon pine and macrocarpa by Tasmanian and mainland luthiers.

Musicians from all over the country will be on hand to sound out the instruments and play concerts, busk, jam and mingle at several venues around Deloraine.

The Little Theatre and Sports Complex on Emu Bay Road will be the main venue for displays of instruments, concerts and workshops, including a masterclass by **ARIA** winning Classical guitarist Gareth Koch workshops by and

Courage, Mustered Justin Johnson, steel guitarist Wayne Appleby and luthier Daniel Brauchli as well as variety concerts on Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday afternoon.

On Saturday and Sunday musicians will perform at the Deloraine and Community Bank marquee at the Riverside caravan park and the river stage. Food and drink vans will supply the vittles.

A walk up concert at the Rotunda will be held on Saturday afternoon, and everyone is invited to bring along their ukulele on Sunday at 12 noon to have a big uke jam session.

One of the highlights will be the community concert staged by The Meander Valley Council at the Community Complex, Alveston Drive on Saturday evening, which will be headlined by top Melbourne country band, Mustered Courage.

Mixing old-school bluegrass with modern roots music, Mustered Courage made a name for themselves in Australia's folk scene in 2011. thanks to a self-titled debut album that won the band a string of warm reviews, plenty of radio support and a trophy at the 2012 Music Oz Awards. After playing every major Australian fold festival in 2012,

these home pickers from Down Under have since made a successful foray into US territory and released their second album, Powerlines. Most recently, they were nominated for two music industry Golden Guitars awards and played at the opening ceremony of this year's Tamworth Country Music Festival.

The concert will also feature the American guitar "Wizard" Justin Johnson, who has achieved fame in America and Europe with his speciality, the Cigar Box Guitar plus a special concert by Deloraine's own, three times Golden Guitar winner, Jean Stafford

Others appearing at StringFest include Philippe Fourstring with his "stompin" Cigar Box guitar, slide guitarist Matty Bayes, Lyn Thomas, Classical Guitarist Matthew Fagan, Hobart's Elanee ensemble, the Launceston Youth Chamber

Orchestra, The Hobart Old Time String Band, As the Crow Flies, pop legend Ronnie Burns, who will be displaying some of his memorabilia, Melbourne flamenco guitarist Vikingo De Jerez, Deloraine's Celtic Confusion, Ed Tuleja, and several local artists.

Buskers will play in spots around the town, and shops will have special window displays. There will also be a Ukulele art competition with entries hung at the Deloraine Creative studios over StringFest.

Council Cutting Back on Energy

MEANDER VALLEY Council are set to slash energy use with upgrades to three of Council's highest energy consuming buildings, commencing in April 2014.

Energy saving measures will improve the comfort of the Great Western Tiers Visitor Centre, the Deloraine Community Complex and Council Offices at Westbury. These will include improvements to insulation and draft-proofing, secondary glazing, ventilation, heat-ing and lighting and the installation of energy efficient hot water systems. 'The three facilities selected for the program are our least efficient buildings,

ARE YOU interested in hosting an international student? If you are, come along and find out more at an AFS Student Exchange Open Day on Sunday, 16th March 2014, from 11am-3pm at the Invermay Bowls Club.

AFS Intercultural Programs is a non-profit, volunteer-based organisation that offers intercultural programs in more than 54 countries and has operated in Australia for over 50 years.

It began during World War I & II. Young Americans serving overseas as volunteer ambulance drivers in the American Field Service (AFS) transported the wounded from the battlefields and helped to liberate concentration camp survivors. When they returned home, they founded a movement to promote peace through international student exchange, now known as AFS Intercultural Programs

In 2014 more than 200 young Australians will embark on an intercultural exchange in over 35 different destinations across the globe including Iceland, Switzerland, Thailand, Panama and Germany.

AFS Australia has sent 15,000 Australian over teenagers overseas and hosted more than 25,000 international exchange students since 1959.

Habits to assist in being financially secure

AS AN ACCOUNTANT, one of the most common questions I hear is 'how can I become financially successful?'

Many people believe the answer is all about making more money. This is incorrect; most of us will live up to our income, spending everything, and often more than, we earn.

A recent survey highlighted 6 habits of financially successful people. These were:

1. Live within your means Do you struggle to pay the bills each month? Actress Keira Knightley famously paid herself just US\$50,000 last year despite the fact that her acting and other work earned her over US\$2 million. Success is about spending less than you earn, which begins by developing an awareness of what you spend, then setting strict budgets.

2. Set small, realistic goals

Small changes can make a very big difference to your financial position. Setting up a plan that automatically regularly deposits a little money into a savings account or pays extra off your mortgage each fortnight can earn or save you tens of thousands of dollars over the long term.

3. Familiarise yourself with finance matters

A person who understands the way a car engine works is far less likely to have car problems because they know the maintenance essentials and the danger signals. Similarly, the wealthy understand the various options open to them no matter what's going on in the market. They regularly seek counsel from financial advisers and accountants while also spending time reading up on financial matters.

4. Take action

Successful people don't believe good things come to those who wait, they go out looking for opportunities. Some people regularly spend money on lottery tickets hoping for a miracle, while successful people are busy taking steps to ensure financial success.

5. Don't buy what you don't need

Wealthy people put their spare money into investments that will provide returns. The less successful fill their homes with items that make them feel wealthy – laptops and big-screen TVs and tablets etc – but which essentially drain their spare funds.

6. Lifestyle habits

Research has shown that financially successful people eat less junk food, count calories and exercise more. They get up three hours before going to work, network and/or do volunteer work five or more hours per month and spend less time on the internet and watching TV. They spend time every day reading information relating to their careers in order to increase their skills and knowledge. Finally, they pass on these habits to their children.

PEOPLE ARE STILL being caught out by scams of various types. Scams come in various guises and are aimed at gaining some advantage over you or your computer or selling you useless services.

Phone

The most common one is a cold call claiming to have detected problems with your computer and asking you to download a remote access programme so they can fix it for you (for a fee). This is complete rubbish as there is no way for any company, except your ISP to associate an internet address with a particular phone number.

If you get such a call say nothing and hang up immediately.

The same applies to any calls claiming to be from

invites you to participate in a survey or contest. If you agree to anything, they take that as the OK to move your phone service to them.

Having caller ID enabled is a good way to avoid these calls as they will usually have an overseas ID.

Email

There are still plenty of email scams floating around.

Again these will claim to be from your financial institution, Paypal, telephone provider, ISP or similar, requiring you to log in via a link to verify or update your details, and claiming that not to do so will mean your account being closed or locked. Never ever click on any links in these emails as they will take you to a fake site where they capture your login details.

As an added security measure for internet banking, ask your financial institution if they provide SMS verification or security tokens to authenticate transfers.

For Paypal you can use their 2 step verification set up so you cannot make a purchase till you enter the security number that is sent to your mobile via SMS. This number expires after 5 minutes so cannot be used at a later date.

Fake ISP and webmail (Hotmail, Gmail etc.) emails are also doing the rounds so be wary of these. Again do not click on any links in the email, even if they ask you to do so to verify your account.

The aim of these is to hijack your email address to send out thousands of spam emails from your account. Meander Valley Gazette

your telephone company, ISP, bank or financial institution or business stating they need to check your account details. Again, say nothing and hang up. If you want to check with any of these companies then ring them using the number provided on any documentation you have.

Another frequent scam is called telephone slamming. This is when a company phones you, often claiming to be representing Telstra, and starts some spiel about cheaper call rates or

With these they can empty your accounts or use your internet banking services to purchase goods with your money. With webmail it also gives them access to your online email address book, so everyone you have emailed will now be on the spammers' email lists. These lists are sold on to other spamming companies so your contacts could end up getting hundreds of spam emails a day.

So please be wary of what you say on the phone to unknown callers, and avoid clicking on links in emails, especially any links that purport to be account logins.

IF YOU'RE interested in working with wood in a friendly environment, drop in at the Deloraine Community Shed.

The Shed is overseen by the Department of Health and Human Services and all are welcome. The coordinator is Barry Pritchard.

The facility is intended to be used by people who are carers or who, because of age, disability or location, are deemed to be socially isolated, so it is as much a social centre as a wood-working one.

The broad definition of social isolation includes home-schooled children who may wish to learn woodwork but do not have the equipment at home.

The charge for using the Shed is \$2 and use of the tools is free. The Shed buys timber in bulk and members pay for the materials used.

It is open from 9am to 2pm Monday to Thursday. Opening times are limited because Barry must be present to comply with Occupational Health & Safety and

insurance requirements and funding only covers his salary for these hours.

Members build their own individual projects, but they sometimes band together to undertake projects for the community. Ahmaddiya – the true Islam By Liz Walker



Dog Listening

DOG LISTENING is a way of communicating with dogs so that they will understand and respond, thus making it easy to eliminate problems such as not coming when called, jumping up on people, excessive barking and destructiveness.

Normally when people welcome a dog into their family, they treat the dog like a human, which is when things begin to go wrong. You wouldn't walk up to someone and unexpectedly ruffletheirhair, would you? Well, it's the same for dogs – they need to be invited into your space while also having their space respected.

It does not mean you cannot cuddle or pat your dog. You've just got to do it in a way that does not confuse it.

Dogs are pack animals and need an ordered hierarchy with a clearly defined leader. Dog Listening uses a gentle, easy to learn method that allows you to calmly take that leadership role. It's all about body language, eye contact and sending clear messages to the animal.

It was devised by Jan Fennell from the UK after many years studying wolves in Yellowstone. This process of communication is called 'Amichien Bonding' and is natural and instinctive to all canines.

Turbo Chooks

TASMANIAN NATIVE Hens are well known for dashing in front of cars or trying to overtake moving vehicles running at speeds of up to 50 km/h - no wonder they're called 'turbo chooks'!

They are large (43-50cm) flightless birds and are one of 12 bird species endemic to Tasmania but, like the Thylacine and Tasmania Devil, once occurred on mainland Australia.

heard Their often aggressive "see-saw" sound, a series of rasping notes produced by at least two birds singing alternatively, is one of their numerous calls. Like the extensive vocal repertoires of other birds, their clicks, cackles, screams and grunts communicate alarm, aggression or distress.

Their calls have different acoustical qualities. Birds are difficult to locate when they emit low frequency sounds and this is advantageous when a bird wants to alert others of danger without drawing attention to its own whereabouts.

Conversely, sharp alarm calls that carry well and are easy to locate attract other family members who come to assist.

Native Hens live in groups of two or more birds. They prefer to feed on cropped plants, and before the arrival of Europeans were restricted to the margins of wetlands, streams or lakes with small grassy areas probably kept short by marsupial herbivores.

The clearing, by Europe-

an settlers, of large areas for farmland, and grazing by sheep and rabbits created ideal habitats for them. This led to conflict with landowners who blamed them for crop losses. They became regarded as vermin and hundreds of birds were eradicated.

Over the years native hen populations have fluctuated in response to the availability of suitable habitat and changes in the populations of competitors and predators. Carnivores once fed almost exclusively on rabbits. When rabbit numbers plummeted after the introduction of myxomatosis native hens once again became prey.

Flightless birds are particularly vulnerable and

many factors threaten their survival. For example extensive areas of cleared farmland covered with eucalypt plantations, have eliminated their habitat.

Native Seeds

ALTHOUGH MOST of my seed collecting endeavours were for growing farm shelter belts, some local native under storey species have been grown for the native garden bed. Many striking native shrubs grow by bush tracks in Meander Valley.

Select the seed capsules which are growing close to the stem and which look ripe - they are usually hard and grey-coloured. Leguminous plants, such as Prickly Beauty (Pultenaea juniperina) and Golden Rosemary (Oxylobium ellipticum), which bloom profusely in November along the bush tracks in Meander Valley, carry their seeds in pods, so they should be collected before they are dispersed

into the surrounding undergrowth.

Hard seeds from leguminous plants germinate more rapidly if very hot - not boiling - water is poured over them and they are left to soak for 24 hours.

Leptospermum seed capsules remain on the bushes for some years. Species which are common in Northern Tasmania are the drought tolerant Manuka (L. scoparium), and the moisture loving Woolly Tea-tree (L. lanigerum). Both of these grow well from seed.

Seed caps should be placed in paper bags and left near a sunny window until the seeds fall out. These small seeds can be separated by passing through a

kitchen sieve onto a sheet of paper and storing in the refrigerator in small jars.

Plants should never be dug from the bush for transplanting because of the danger of spreading Phytophthera (die-back).

It is quite easy to germinate the seeds in native potting mix in a polystyrene box disinfected with 20ml/ litre water (punch some holes in the base). Separate species in rows in alphabetical order, and keep a list.

The seedlings can then be planted singly into clean, disinfected native tubes and placed on a table in dappled shade at first and kept moist.

After a week or so they should be placed in full sun against a North facing wall, and watered daily with a fine spray.

The Steppes Historical Reserve

THE STEPPES Site (located near the junction of Highland Lakes & Interlaken Roads in the Central Highlands) has a long and fascinating history dating from 1864.

It was the home of the Wilson family for 112 years and during much of that time was the hub of local community life, incorporating not only the Homestead, but also a police station, post office, bakery and school.

The family had a strong connection with the bush and the environment in which they lived to the extent that they pushed for an area at the Steppes to become a bird sanctuary and, in 1930, a reserve was proclaimed under the Animal & Bird Protection act. Today, this reserve honours the family whose name is synonymous with the area.

As part of its Partnership Agreement with Parks & Wildlife Service, the Mountain Huts Preservation Society has undertaken restoration and repair work at The Steppes Historic Site. Working bees commenced in September 2010.

John Graham, retired shingle splitter gave many weekends of his time providing expert knowledge in the art of shingle splitting, with well in excess of 2450 shingles being split.

Several working bees throughout the course of 2011/2012/2013 resulted in four outbuildings and the bake house being re-roofed and associated maintenance work completed.

The Bothwell Historical Society, through Gwen Hardstaff, compiled and supplied the informative interpretation for the panels located in the information shelter that can be found at the rear of the Homestead site, near to the commencement of the short walk to the Steppes Sculptures.



Members of the Bothwell Historical Society will be holding a Bush BBQ lunch on Sunday 27th April to thank the Mountain Huts Preservation Society, John Graham and others for their dedication to the project and to



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
BEHIND THE DOOR

PGA Golf Pro Sets Up Shop In The Meander Valley

PETER FREELAND will become the only resident PGA Golf Club Professional on a nine-hole course in Tasmania when he sets up shop at the Quamby Estate Golf Club in March.

Peter, a former butcher, State squad cricketer and footballer says he is looking forward to his new challenge and thinks the potential of the Quamby course could see it become one of Tasmania's finest.

Although playing for Tasmania in under 19 cricket at the time, Peter's passion for the game of golf started when he took it up at the age of 16 while working as a butcher at the family supermarket in Exeter. "By the time I got to the age of 20 I was hooked on golf and had to resign from the State cricket squad and eventually gave away the game of cricket at the age of 21." he says.

At 28 Peter decided to leave the family business and pursue a career in golf and started a traineeship at Riverside GC under Paul Johns which lasted three years, ending in 1999 with Peter being awarded the PGA Trainee Of The Year.

Hefinished first out of three hundred trainees and was the first Tasmanian to achieve this prestigious accolade.

It was fitting that Peter started his golf at Riverside (where he also became Club Champion) because a distant relative was one of that club's founders.

In 2003 a neck injury saw Peter temporarily stop playing tournaments and take up the position of Club Professional at Grinderwald Golf Club in the Tamar Valley where he remained for four years.

It was during this period he saw the start of the very popular mini-golf venue at Grinderwald.

Peter's career has seen him winning Pro-Ams and other golf events in Queensland, South Australia, Victoria and Tasmania with a special highlight being his second place in the 2007 Australian PGA Club Professional Championship at Palm Meadows on the Gold Coast where he had a six under par opening round.

He has also won two (back to back) Tasmanian PGA Club Professional Championships.

In 2008 he was part of the winning team representing Riverside in the National Holden Scramble at Twin Waters where he managed a hole in one during the final round.

This year he won the Exeter Pro-Am and was second in the Port Sorell Pro-Am and has a couple of other top ten finishes in other tournaments.

Peter's first task at Quamby will be to organise an open-day for visitors in order to allow golfers from everywhere to come and experience the unique and challenging layout.

"Quamby golf course is just such a nice place to be, with beautiful surrounds and spectacular views. For a nine-hole course it plays like an eighteen-hole course with long fairways and big subtle greens." He is also keen to see Pro-Am tournaments and more Corporate golf days taking place at the venue.
