

Culzean is a ten acre gar-



This ELK is an innovative air powered cushion designed to lift a fallen person from the floor with a stable and stress-free lift so it is ideal when someone has fallen in a confined space.

In addition to lessening any risk of further injury to the patient, it also minimises the risks associated with moving and handling for the ambulance worker as it can lift up to 450 kg.

Previously only available in Launceston, Devonport or Burnie, this useful piece of equipment was welcomed by Craig Broomhall and Christian Francois from the Deloraine station.

### A snappy career

THE GAZETTE is fortunate enough to have been joined this month by Mike Moores, a press photographer of many years standing.

Mike started working in newspapers in the Manchester area in the UK. At the time Manchester had seven daily papers and two evening ones. This all changed with the arrival of television with papers closing or moving to London. As a fairly recent addition to the staff Mike was one of the first to be made redundant and decided to emigrate.

However, the UK's loss was Australia's gain when Mike moved to Brisbane

and started working for the Courier Mail where he stayed for 15 years before being head-hunted by The Sun. He soon rose to the highest level there and became Pictorial Editor of both weekday and Sunday editions.

At the same time he was teaching press and public relations photography at the Seven Hills College of Art before doing a spell at the University of South East Oueensland at Toowoomba.

When Murdoch bought the Courier Mail, the Sun was closed as he wasn't allowed to run two papers in the same city, so Mike then opened a freelance business and ran this until his retirement and move to Tasmania.



During his time in Brisbane he won Press Photographer of the Year awards three times and came first in the Rothmans Press Photography awards as well as several state sporting photographer awards.

We look forward to working with Mike and foresee a strong improvement in the calibre of the paper's pictures.

## A man for all reasons

**DANIEL BURKE (1827-1927)** lived to be 100 years old and during that lengthy span gave much to the community of Westbury.

He arrived in Hobart in 1830 having sailed from Ireland with his family. His father was a farmer and Daniel followed this occupation.

In 1857 he became a member of the Exton Road Trust his first step on a distinguished path in public life.

Daniel was a founding member of the Westbury Municipal Council in 1863 and went on to serve the Council for 60 years. He was first appointed

Warden (Mayor) in 1871 and held the position over forty two years until he retired, aged 95, in 1923.

During this period he was instrumental in establishing infrastructure and services in Westbury such as the School Board and Board of Health and Agricultural Society. He also found time to act as magistrate, coroner and Member of the House of Assembly for Cressy (1893 -1903).

As a colonist and loyal Irishman, it was Daniel who hid the legendary Irish Exile, John Mitchel, in 1853 and kept him from the clutches of the Westbury militia. Mitchel escaped to America and wrote his famous text, 'lail Journal' which had much to say in praise of Dan Burke.

For services to Tasmanian civic life, Daniel has no peers. His 65 years of commitment remains a record to this day. His ancestors still live in the Westbury area and gather on the Village Green each St Patrick's Festival to honour him.

A celebration event will be held to recognise Daniel's achievements on Sunday 9th November at the Holy Trinity Church, Westbury, commencing 2.00 pm. All are welcome to attend. Please RSVP to mail@mvc.tas. gov.au or 6393 5300 by 31st October to assist catering.

## **Marsupials**

TASMANIA HAS 18 native marsupial species ranging in size from the tiny 7 gram little pygmy possum to the large 45 kilogram eastern grey kangaroo. There is one introduced species, the sugar glider; and one extinct species, the thylacine.

All marsupials have evolved specialised digestive systems to deal with Australia's predominantly hard, dry and leathery (i.e. sclerophyllous) vegetation. They also have various breeding strategies to cope with changing circumstances such as drought.

In 1816 the fundamental difference in the reproductive systems of female mammals was discovered. What are now called marsupials (Gk marsupion pouch) were originally named Didelphia (Gk di two; delphia uteri), a word that alludes to marsupials' two vaginae, two uteri and two oviducts. (Placental mammals have a single vagina, cervix and uterus and only the oviducts are paired.) This is what really sets marsupials apart from the placental mammals and monotremes.

Most marsupial species have a yolky egg with a thin shell from which the embryo is born after 10-12 days. The embryo crawls to the pouch and attaches to the teat.

Its lips grow around the teat and the structure of its mouth allows it to suck and breathe simultaneously.

The milk of marsupials changes considerably through the extended period of lactation. While it is supporting the initial growth of the tiny bean-sized young the milk is a dilute fluid with more sugars than fats.

By the time the young become independent animals at the end of lactation, the milk is rich in proteins and fats with very little sugar.

The constituent sugars, fats, proteins, salts and minerals change during the lactation in relation to the needs of the

developing young; the sequence of changes seems to be constant for different species.

When there are several young in the pouch, as is often the case, the more advanced offspring will receive high-fat low-protein milk from one teat and the younger offspring will get high-protein low-fat milk from another teat.

## Delphiniums are delightful

DELPHINIUMS ARE now beginning to send up their tall stately spikes for their first flowering in November. If the spent flowers are re-

moved and the plant cut back a little, they will bloom again in May/June.

Frost has no effect on these predominantly perenniblue They are, however, intolerant of drought, and need a rich, drained, well fertile soil, to which plenty of organic matter has been added. November is often windy, so flowering heads need a stake, and shelter from north westerly winds. They may be lifted and

divided every few years.

In the Meander Valley they should survive for many years, as they cannot tolerate very hot weather conditions.

Beetroot

Seeds of this versatile and increasingly valued root vegetable, along with others may be sown now, but hold off on green bush beans until the end of October, as they

fertiliser should be spread and raked in before sowing sparsely in drills 20 to 30cms. apart. If soil is very alkaline, or has been heavily limed, then half a teaspoon of boron per 4 litres of water may be

prefer a warmer soil in which to germinate.

Beetroot seeds will germinate more readily if they are soaked in water for a few hours first. A little mixed

added after sowing. Keep moist until seedlings emerge in two weeks, and thin to 5 to 8 cms. Beetroot relish is a delicious and easy way to preserve any surplus roots.



## Computer terms 101 - pt. 1

IN RESPONSE to a letter to the Editor, in this issue I will explain a few of the more common technology terms as simply as possible over the next few months. So let's get started, beginning with connectors and peripherals.

Peripherals are any part that is separate from a computer's CPU, such as a printer, a keyboard, monitor or USB.

#### **USB:- Universal Serial Bus**

The standard USB plugs are on the front and back of the computer case and are for plugging in various peripherals and gadgets like keyboards, mice, external storage, printers, cameras and so on and are rectangular in shape with a small plastic tab inside the plug to key the lead so it only goes in one way. On notebooks they are generally on the back or sides. USB provides a standardised interface for data connectivity and power supply to connected devices.

May be labelled as USB 1.0, USB 2.0 or USB 3.0 (3.1). The different versions have different data transfer speeds with USB 3.0/3.1 being the fastest and all versions are theoretically cross compatible. The advantage of USB is the standardisation of connection it provides and the "hot plug" nature of it which means devices can be plugged in and unplugged without switching off the computer. The device end of the USB plug can be several different sizes and shapes called Type A and Type B, standard, mini and micro.

Bluetooth

This is a wireless standard designed for short and very short wireless communication between devices (e.g. two smart phones or headset

to phone). It is named after King Harald "Bluetooth" Gormsson, King of Denmark and later Norway around c. 960, credited with unifying Denmark and Norway. In use it is designed to be a quick and simple way of connecting two or more Bluetooth capable devices quickly and easily for a temporary or short term connection. Range is about 60 metres max.

#### LAN (Local Area Network)

This is your local network (wired or wireless) behind your internet router or modem with all your own devices connected to it via Ethernet or wireless LAN so they can share files, stream audio and video or just get an Internet connection. This is what most people with Internet connections now have. The Router/modem handles all the internet connection details rather than each device having to create its own internet connection.

#### WIFI (WI-FI)

This is the one that probably causes the most confusion for people. WIFI is a local area wireless communication technology designed to create a Wireless Local Area Network of devices (WLAN for short). It should not be confused with mobile wireless internet using mobile wireless towers, NBN fixed wireless Internet or Bluetooth. WLAN networks can be as small as covering a house or just a few rooms, or, with the appropriate hardware, out to several hundreds of metres. WI-FI range is generally greater than Bluetooth and is ideal for more permanent home connections for portable or mobile devices, or where you don't want Ethernet leads running.

However, due to limited channels it can often suffer interference from other wireless networks in the area.

## **Back in action - Deloraine Power Station**

DATING BACK to 1907, the Deloraine power station was the first to have been built and operated by a local authority in Australia. Now it has been re-commissioned to, once again, produce hydro-electricrenewable ity. This may be the oldest operating power station in Australia. Historically, it was built by the local Council to power the township and nearby flour mills.

Owner, Paul Noordanus has undertaken the high-quality restoration and construction work, while James Fox of Fox Design Pty Ltd has managed the project and designed and manufactured the turbine.

The Deloraine power station is a heritage restoration for the actual building, but when it comes to the power generation system, it is the latest technology. "This is a high-quality engineering project, thanks to the availability of skilled engineers and metal workers in Tasmania" says James. Altogether around 50 Tasmanians have worked on the project and the new stainless steel turbine was specifically designed for the site. It operates all year round, quietly and automatically, producing twenty kilowatts (kW), or enough to power 10 homes. Some of this will be used on the premises, with

a planned café and visitor's centre on site, the remainder

Small hydro power stations have a new relevance because they can be connected to the national electricity grid and the power they produce displaces dirty coal-fired power. The Deloraine power station will be eligible for renewable energy credits. It uses the existing weir and channel and provides an economic source of renewable energy to the community.

James Fox says "there is potential for this project to be duplicated across Tasmania. We have the expertise and the manufacturing industry right here in Tasmania."

Jason Gibson, 41, and his girlfriend bought the brand new, four-bedroom residence in Hadspen, in October 2013.


"We have been gobsmacked at the difference in our power bills since we moved in and how comfortably we've been living," Mr Gibson said.

Mr Gibson said he spotted the Hadspen house for sale online and was immediately taken with its spacious layout and modern design.


"These days, everyone wants to sell you on bats for insulation but when you have sandwich panels like this, which is steel either side of a polystyrene core, there is nothing better. From my background in caravans I also understood that, structurally, the steel would be incredibly strong.

"In summer, the house had also been remarkably cool when outdoor temperatures sometimes topped 30 degrees", he said.

Another benefit of the solid steel construction with double-glazed windows and solid timber outer doors was the high sound-proof level, which ensured peace and quiet.

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

## Rural Bank nurtures Meander Valley farmers

IN 2000, as the major banks were closing branches all over rural and regional Australia, a banking licence was granted to Elders Rural Bank which formed a 50/50 partnership with the Bendigo and Adelaide Bank Group to fill the need for a specialist Agribusiness bank.

In 2010 Elders sold its share to Bendigo, and Rural Bank is now a wholly owned subsidiary. However, its remit has not changed – merely expanded. The Bank exists to offer financial assistance and advice to farmers all over Australia.

Rural Bank is mostly funded with stable retail deposits which means it is not at the mercy of volatile international markets. This, plus its strict investment guidelines for its liquid investments, means that its balance sheet has proved resilient during times of drought and economic upheavals.

At a time of ever-increasing globalisation it is comforting to have a wholly owned Australian bank with relationship officers who understand

In addition, the staff is proud of the fact that the bank has returned money to the local Meander community in the form of grants for local bodies which has, so far, totalled \$750,000.

The local team is small. David Robertson and James Cameron are the Relationship Managers, both of whom grew up on farms and have had many years' experience in rural services.

They are ably supported by Jo Davidson, who is visibly enthusiastic about her job and strives to ensure her clients are given as much support as they need.

Growth for Rural Bank in the Meander Valley area has been remarkable. From July 2013 to June 2014 lending grew by 45% and deposits increased by 25%.

In the first two months of this financial year, lending has grown by 10% and deposits have increased by a whopping 325%.

## Bigger does not mean better

AFTER FIVE weeks of visiting farms, farmer's markets and festivals across western Canada and USA, Tasmanian Rural Women's Award winner, Annette Reed, has returned home with one clear message: "It's not about the size of your farm but what you do with it that matters."

"A lot of the places we visited there are only two or three acres and they are thriving businesses," she said.

She says her trip has hammered home the need for small farm enterprises to have a point of difference and convinced her that the family's own business is on the right track.

"We don't do conventional tomatoes – everybody might have tomatoes but they don't have tomatoes like ours," Annette said. "And when you're dealing with such a small parcel of land, you can't just do what everybody is doing – you can't produce masses of anything because you haven't got the space."

Annette will share what she's learnt from her trip at a series of one-day workshops around Tasmania. Each day is intended to be low key, relaxed, informative and grass roots in its approach.

Each workshop will include



## Government turns on lights at Bracknell FC

THE BRACKNELL Football Club is an incorporated non-profit community organisation whose main focus is the ongoing management support of all aspects of the region's three football teams. The Club has been established for over 80 years and is based at the Bracknell Recreation Ground.

The Bracknell FC utilises the ground and their

clubrooms for a range of community activities, celebrations and fundraising events and also allows a wide range of other community organisations such as the Bracknell Boys and Girls Club and the Bracknell Primary School to use the facility for their own activities.

The Club's chief source of funding is through the operation of a kiosk and bar on football home game days, the provision of meals to community members on home game nights, and fundraising activities in the local community. Its policy is only to spend funding in line with monies available and consequently it never operates in deficit.

The club has a number of major sponsors including the Bracknell Hotel, McLean's Health Care, and William Adams who provide funding to support game costs

such as guernseys, umpire costs, player fees, insurance etc. Although the Club is in a strong financial position all monies available are required to make the Club viable for the 2015 season and beyond.

The Club is currently undertaking the upgrading of the lighting around the Bracknell Recreation Ground. Adequate lighting is paramount for training at any footy club and Bracknell is no exception. The last major upgrade was conducted in the year 2000 and subsequently the lights no longer meet expectations for players playing in the second tier football of Tasmania.

The redevelopment of the lighting around the ground will be a very significant benefit to the Bracknell FC and the community. It will enhance the facility and the Club greatly and, more importantly, will ensure the ongoing viability of the football club.

While the population of Bracknell is only approximately 450, the Club is a regional one and supports a far greater population. The football club itself has 300 members from around surrounding Consequently it is a focal point for the area and vital to the wellbeing of the local community.

The Bracknell Club is extremely grateful to local MP Mark Shelton for his work and commitment to the Bracknell Football Club and to the Government for keeping their election promise of \$25,000 to make the upgrade of the lighting a reality.

In a Government Press Release, Mark Shelton stated "These works are Shelton important to ensure that the Club can continue to be competitive and play an active role in the community long into the future."
