"I AM JUST trying to take care of our local environment by picking up all the rubbish," says Simon Williams when responding to the people who stop to ask him what he is doing.

"I managed to pick up every scrap of paper, plastic, bottle and can all the way from Deloraine to my back door," adds the Weetah resident on his project to rid our country roads of rubbish.

Simon moved to Tasmania eighteen months ago for a simpler life away from big cities.

While travelling around the island state

he began to notice just how much rubbish lined the roads.

"I just had to do something about it because it seemed like no-one was picking up any of the trash. And it was just getting worse and worse," he laments.

A plan to begin tackling the issue hatched one morning when Simon drove to Deloraine. "I decided I'd walk all the way back to my house. I took a white Hessian bag and picked up all the rubbish on the left hand side of the road - everything I could possibly find all the way home - about 20 kilometres away."

Then he pedalled

back to Deloraine on his pushbike to pick up his car to fill it with rubbish from the small piles he had made along the way. It took him fifteen hours.

The next day he got up and did the same for the other side of the road.

Stored in his garage, the rubbish made an impressive pile. According to neighbour, Roger Davies, "it was huge".

Roger goes on to say that the work Simon has done "is inspirational" and that he will be putting in more effort to keep his verge litter free.

Of the pile of he collected, Simon said "I was jumping up and down on it like Scrooge McDuck. One thing

I noticed is that it is all

recyclable stuff".

Simon spent three days sorting it into glass, cans, paper and cardboard before taking three van loads to the tip. He found that 90% was recyclable.

"It was kind of frustrating as well because I did one side of the road and came to pick up my piles and I found that people had already had a few beers on the side of the road and just thrown their cans in the bush. I must have picked up thousands of cans. We live in the best place in Australia and still we are having this problem"

"One thing that would make a huge

difference in Tasmania is if we could get ten cents a can return like South Australia," he advocates. "You see five times less cans on the side of the road there."

Roger agrees: "Anything worth money doesn't lie on the side of the road!"

Simon now has his eyes set on cleaning up the Lakes Road from Deloraine all the way

to Hobart.

"I think it's really important, our environment; it's up to us. Locally, we all need to do our part."

A 'GINORMOUS' thank you to all the people and organisations that contacted politicians to speak in favour of continuing funding for the Deloraine and Mole Creek Online centres - the places where volunteers and staff gather each month to produce the Meander Valley Gazette.

Gratefully, we received notice from the Education department that funding has been assured to the end of 2016 for ours and other community managed online centres around the state.

During the process we learnt more deeply of the value that our services provide to people - from those who have no other way of contacting their families who live overseas, to those who view Online Centres as a way of making the generally isolating experience of modern technology a social adventure, and to those who love reading Meander Valley Gazette each month because it helps them feel connected to local news, stories and businesses.

We literally had people running in the door saying "how can I help save the paper?!"

I fear the struggle to maintain funding from government is far from over. In fact, funding has already been frozen for many years.

Now we are being asked to reduce our paid staff hours, which will inevitably impact on the quality of services we are able to provide.

It reminds me of the slow demise of the Adult Education service, once a thriving system that had employees in most largish towns that organised a full program of short courses in subjects ranging from bricklaying to French cooking that were all in nearby venues.

Over many years Adult Ed was slowly strangled by the reduction of funding to the point where it is almost, but not quite, dead!

It seems the plan for Online Centres is similar - a death by a thousand cuts, literally.

Lifelong learning is a supposed goal of Education nowadays, but where is this going to happen? At home using Google?

Yes, maybe, if you are one of the lucky ones that has reasonable internet access.

As a community we cannot allow ourselves to become complacent. If we want to maintain the services that we have, it will require an ongoing effort on our part.

We have recently witnessed the power of public opinion here in Deloraine. Once when a proposed bottle shop was proposed and defeated, and now when united efforts have resulted in a funding reprieve for Deloraine and Mole Creek Online Centres.

As reductions in services to the community are usually conducted by stealth, we need to remain vigilant.

Michelle lends support

Michelle visited the centre to provide some tips for our campaign and what follows are some of the comments she made during her visit.

"There is the ability to tell local stories that doesn't happen in communities in other ways and also there is the opportunity that people are safe navigating the online playground or the online world, and people need skills to do that so to lose a facility

like this would be concerning."

"We think the government has come pretty close to, if not already achieved, all the financial savings that it identified so I'm not sure that cutting online access centres meets their previous budget policy anyway."

"As an MP in parliament I can raise the issue and that has a certain impact, but there is nothing more powerful than the story of an individual who says to a politician, this is why this service matters to me and this is why I want you to sustain and maintain it."

"Online Access centres are safe places that build community connectedness. Why would you take that away?"

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
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Local foundation assists elderly

FEDERAL DEPUTY Opposition Leader and Shadow Minister for Health, Tanya Plibersek, recently took some time to smell the roses with residents, staff and board members of Kanangra Aged Care Home in Deloraine.

Ms Plibersek, who is a keen gardener, added to her knowledge by quizzing Deloraine Aged Care gardener of 3 years, Wendy Green, while touring the carefully tended sensory gardens surrounding the facility.

Cliff Partridge, Chief Executive Officer of Aged Care Deloraine, conducted the tour, pointing out the many design features that promote a sense of homeliness for residents.

Ms Plibersek was in Tasmania supporting Brian Mitchell in his candidacy for Lyons in the coming federal election.

Mr Mitchell encouraged the deputy leader to visit Kanangra to see its fantastic facility for herself.

"He is quite right – it has just been wonderful to see the high level of care and the beautiful surroundings," said Ms Plibersek.

"I think the great thing about this facility is that you have the national rental affordability units next door. So people who do not need assistance with everyday living can live in a place with subsidised rental and a strong sense of community. But as their needs increase, they can easily move into higher care facilities," she added.

Her time there was also spent discussing future needs of the local aging population with board members of Aged Care Deloraine.

"Management already have people on waiting lists both for this facility and the national rental affordability scheme properties.

So being able to invest in rebuilding, expanding and extending services in the future is a really important issue in forward planning," said Ms Plibersek.

IN THE GARDEN WITH NELL CARR

A DRY SPRING this year is devastating for farmers and gardeners alike.

Farms have no surplus pasture to save for hay or silage and, for gardeners in towns, watering becomes very expensive.

There are few vegetables which can thrive without irrigation, except perhaps asparagus. This has continued to send up a succession of succulent spears with only the occasional dousing.

It is surpising just how much water a top-loading machine uses.

Washing water can be saved with a special hose from the drainpipe into 50Litre garbage bins. Soapy water from the first cycle can be used for washing paths and the car.

Rinsing water can be be poured around trees and shrubs, except for acid lovers like Rhododendrons and Camellias.

Mulching with autumn leaves, mushroom compost or pea straw both nourish the vegetables and keep the roots moist. But mulch should be

kept well away from stems, and should never be dug in.

Potatoes should be well hilled up with earth to prevent greening of the growing tubers before mulching with a thick layer of straw.



Cistus purpureus

There are many plants and shrubs which will resist dry periods. Members of the Cistaceae family from the Mediterranean countries of S.Europe can withstand long periods without water.

Among them are Cistus purpureus (pictured) and C. incanus, the latter grown very easily from cuttings, and the dwarf profusely-flowering Helianthemum (Sun Rose) - all flowering November and December.

Westbury needs new firies

WESTBURY FIRE Brigade members were at the Westbury Show teaching the correct use of fire blankets and extinguishers.

The Brigade is looking for new recruits both male and female to begin training for what could be a busy fire season. With little spring rain the soil dryness index, and therefore likelihood of dangerous fire conditions, is at an all time high.

Tasmania Fire Service recommends that you should NOT plan to defend your home when the:

· Fire Danger Rating

QUAMBY SHOES Deloraine

exceeds 50 (severe) in your area, unless you have created a defendable space and emberproofed your home.

- Fire Danger Rating exceeds 75 (extreme) in your area, unless your home has a defendable space and has been designed and built specifically to withstand a bushfire.
- Fire Danger Rating exceeds 100 (catastrophic) in your area, regardless of any preparations you have made, unless firefighters have assessed your home as defendable deadly.

Cyber crims using high tech extortion

FOR A COUPLE of years now a rather nasty bit of ransomware called Cryptolocker has been doing the rounds.

Once on your computer this awful piece of software starts encrypting your personal files. This means all your documents, photos, and the like cannot be opened by you.

The only chance of recovery of these files is by paying the ransom (hence the name ransomware). Details on how to pay are part of the message you receive about your files "being encrypted for your own protection".

This warning may even include a (fake) logo purporting to be the US Department of Justice and the FBI and claim your files have been locked because you have visited illegal sites.

This ransomware will also encrypt personal files on any external drives attached to your computer, any personal files stored in mapped network drives, network shares, and cloud services like Dropbox, Onedrive, iCloud or other cloud storage that shows up as connected to your computer.

It may also encrypt backup files created with specialised

backup software if those files are stored on any of the above storage systems. The only safe data is data stored on write once media like DVDs or CDs or on external storage that is not connected to a computer.

Removing most variants of Cryptolocker is not all that difficult (most antivirus programmes will remove it).

However, this does not unlock your files. The only way to unlock your files is to pay the ransom. This is generally paid via Bitcoin and can vary from around \$200.00 up to thousands of dollars. Even then, paying is no guarantee of getting your files unlocked.

The good news is the Cryptolocker network was taken down last year by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), along with law enforcement agencies in Australia, Germany, France, Japan, Ukraine, U.K and others. This has slowed the spread of Cryptolocker.

The bad news is new variants generally referred to as 'Cryptowall' have sprung up.

Most infections appear to

be coming from attachments in spam email and drive by downloads.

Crucially, these attacks are usually downloaded and run in the background in a manner that is invisible to you, and without you clicking on anything.

Just the act of viewing a web-page that harbours this malicious code is enough for the attack to run!

So how do you avoid getting Cryptowall? First make sure you have some form of security suite software installed.

Keep Windows up to date with Microsoft security patches, avoid clicking on emails from unknown senders, especially those with attachments, and even be wary of email attachments from people or businesses you know, especially if they are not expected or have odd titles or text.

Lastly, make sure you do regular backups or copies of your personal data to an external hard drive that is only connected to the computer when doing the backup.

Of course, do not connect the drive to do one last backup if you are already infected or think you may be infected.

ENTALLY ESTATE came to life in November as hundreds of gardening enthusiasts flocked to Gardenfest 2015.

Now in its eighth year, Gardenfest provides an opportunity for people to ask questions and acquire new plants and decorations to add to their own gardens.

Event organiser Sue Dibella was impressed by the number of people on opening day.

"FROM THE moment we drove up the driveway, we just knew we wanted to put an offer on it," says Carloyn Scott-Burgess of the family's 50-acre property in Golden Valley.

Bought in 2003, Carolyn and her husband, Dale Burgess, were keen to provide their then three small children with a "feeling of a sustainable life on the land and an understanding of animals."

"We've never had any disease here because we keep them vaccinated. It's a standard, particularly as they are a pet animal."

Dale's work in mining and Carolyn's, as a geologist, inevitably took them away from the property; returning from Vietnam to live in Golden Valley two years ago.

The idea for rearing miniature goats on this property came from their son, Dominic.

The family had seen some during their travels in England but it was he who inspired his parents to purchase, given the quirky animals' quaint personalities.

"They are good tempered and... a lot more playful. So they bring a lot of joy into our

lives," shares Carolyn.

She adds, "They have been very good for establishing a pasture here that is weed free... because they are browsers. They like to eat lots of things that other grazing animals do not."

One of only a handful

of miniature goat studs in Tasmania, 'Attunga' has a number of mini goats grazing their lush wallaby proofed pastures.

Having only been around 20 years, miniature goats as a breed are relatively new in Australia and are "still very much in the establishment phase".

There are three grades: A, B or C - dependent on the height of the goats' shoulder, with an A grade measuring 57 cm or under to this height.

Bloodlines are varied. "They are a breed in them-

selves but have had roots in many breeds that have come together," comments Carolyn.

About the size of a medium dog, miniature goats are bred primarily to be sold as pets.

Management practices include de-budding of horns at a young age, a five-in-one vaccination, and regular hoof care to prevent foot rot.

"We've never had any disease here because we keep them vaccinated. It's a standard, particularly as they are a pet animal they may be going to people who are not used to having livestock," says Carolyn.

These goats handle the snow very well, and are fine for rain or wind but not together.

"So we have in each paddock some form of shelter, small sheds built by Dale that they can sneak into if they need to," she adds.

Gestation for goats is five months, so two kids per year is possible.

At Attunga, the choice is to breed only one lot of kids per year, as it helps reduce stress on the animals and the family caring for them.

BEING THE agricultural region that it is, it was an honour for the Meander Valley as a whole to have principal of Hagley Farm School Michael Davy and Tasmanian lead Agricultural teacher Andrew Harris being awarded Hardie Fellowships to study in the United States.

They were among twelve Tasmanian teachers to receive the fellowships at a ceremony in Hobart last month.

The Hardie Fellowship was established in 2002 after the death of Charles Hardie, a Dean at UTAS who imparted in his will that two Trusts of over \$7 million were to be established.

These Trusts – The Hardie Fellowship Trust and the Hardie Education Trust – are designed to recognise excellence in the study of education and to allow teachers to further their education abroad.

As a result of being granted this opportunity, Mr Davy and Mr Harris will examine exemplary practices in agricultural education as well as elements of aquaculture, viticulture and sustainability.


As part of this, they will study at Auburn University in Alabama, Cornel University in New York, and the University of California.

"It's a fabulous opportunity. There are 800,000 students that participate in a formal agricultural education program. So we're very keen to investigate their programs," said Mr Davy.

This opportunity to raise Tasmania's agricultural standards certainly comes at a good time as it is predicted that our agricultural output will expand over the next decade.

"It's our 160th year as a school and we're looking to establish some future directions for the school. We want to improve student engagement and retention, and mentor and model good pedagogy in agricultural education," he said.

common sense and right humane requirements, but marriage is quite another issue... To marry; is to join, and when applied to human kind, the components, both the moral and physiological, required to establish a lasting union, have been fixed by the Designer and Lawgiver.

Equalised treatment of same sex couples in areas of Taxation, Social Security, Health, Aged Care, Superannuation, Immigration, Child Support and Family Law are

The proliferation of the human race, has occurred and been maintained by not only having the physical components of the subjects to be joined, but the emotional and physiological details set in order.

Up to the flood of Noah's time, man increasingly reverted to the exercise of his will, to the setting aside of God's will, a behaviour introduced by our first parents, and consistently he failed to govern himself, so that his behaviour became more and more offensive and destructive, requiring the putting of government, into the hands of the responsible elements of society to discharge (Genesis 9:4-7), which in consequence, led to public recognition of the 'married state' initiated by God when He said (Genesis 2:24) "Therefore shall a man leave his father and mother and cleave to his wife and they shall become one flesh."

A casual or even extended sexual relationship, can't be said to fulfil the requirements of the statements of Genesis, the word cleave, implies a union which is lawful, exclusive and permanent. The primeval law governing this bond, goes beyond the bounds of the church, embracing the whole of humanity.

Westermarck, who lived from 1862 to 1939, said "marriage is rooted in the family rather than the family in marriage."

In every area of human experience, the intention of God, regarding the existence of man, is to be observed, so to set God's will aside is to invite a situation where mans finite insights, hasten the breakdown of society.

In 2 Samuel 23:3 the inspired words of king David assert "the ruler among men shall be just, ruling in the fear of God" then the Biblical record Romans 1:21-32 which reads "Because, knowing God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but fell into folly in their thoughts, and their heart without understanding was darkened: professing themselves to be wise, they became fools, and changed the glory of the incorruptible God into the likeness of an image of corruptible man and of birds and quadrupeds and reptiles. Wherefore God gave them up in the lusts of their hearts to uncleanness, to dishonour their bodies between themselves: who changed the truth of God into falsehood, and honoured and served the creature more than him who created it, who is blessed forever Amen. For this reason God gave them up to vile lusts; for both the females changed the natural use into that contrary to nature; and in like manner the males also, leaving the natural use of the female, were inflamed in their lust towards one another; males with males working shame, and receiving in themselves the recompense of their error which was fit. And according as they did not think good to have God in their knowledge, God gave them up to a reprobate mind to practise unseemly things; being filled with all unrighteousness, wickedness, covetousness, malice; full of envy, murder, strife, deceit evil disposition; whisperers, backbiters, hateful to God, insolent, proud, boasters, inventers of evil things, disobedient to parents, void of understanding, faithless, without natural affection, unmerciful; who knowing the righteous judgement of God, that they who do such things are worthy of death, not only practise them, but have fellow delight in those who do them."

This leaves no doubt, that it's possible to know God and yet not to honour Him, indeed, even to think it's not good to have Him in our thoughts. Details as recorded in this passage, cover ideas that men generate who are opposed to Gods order in creation, but we are left to understand that if we would enjoy the guardianship of God, it will be on His terms and not ours. It's not a pleasant prospect to be given up by God to a reprobate mind, a mind void of understanding.

Though these thoughts deal with the broad human experience, they won't be readily accepted by all, because man as born of Adam isn't subject to God's law, indeed he is at enmity with God.

The base on which human marriage rests isn't love, but righteousness and righteousness is the fulfilment of the duties of relationships, God is the determinator of righteousness not man.

stated, "The dream started a long time ago and is ongoing."


"The most important part of the dojo is the people who train in it. There is a wonderful group of people training in Tasmania and we continue to use the Dojo for trainings and seminars.


"Aikido is something we practise in the Dojo but it is also a place for people to use for
