Festival for the young at heart

IT ALL began when Christine Chilcott, board member of Aged Care Deloraine wanted to have an exhibition at Grenoch aged care facility.

"I wanted people to see that growing old doesn't have to be a negative thing," says Christine.

Meanwhile, when attending and speaking at an International

conference, Deloraine Aged Care's Music Therapist, Alex Morse heard about Scotland's monthlong creative ageing festival 'Luminate'.

Luminate aims to bring people together to celebrate their creativity as they age.

Alex shared this information with Christine and together they hatched a plan to create something similar

in Meander Valley.

What started out to be a trial attracted so much interest from other community groups and services that the inaugural '2016 Meander Valley Festival of Creative Ageing' boasts 22 events over 9 venues running from 10th to 14th October.

"I'm very proud of what the community has put together to support older adults to have meaningful creative lives," comments Alex, Director of the festival.

Two Social Work students on work placement with Deloraine District Hospital, Deloraine House and Deloraine High School have been helping to organise various events.

Ebony De Jesus and Isabella Bracey have especially enjoyed finding and interviewing the subjects for 'Life Portraits', an exhibition of works by photographer Valentina Ricchi to be shown at the Great Western Tiers Community Club.

"It was wonderful to hear the life stories of the people who were photographed for the exhibition," says Ebony, "they have had such interesting lives."

"The photographs express the life journey of the subjects in such a

powerful way," explains Isabella.

The festival will incorporate the creative talents of people from within Meander Valley but has also invited musicians, artists and dancers from all over Tasmania to be involved.

Mature Artist Dance Experience (MADE) will be travelling from Hobart to Deloraine Day Centre to provide a workshop.

I'M NOT too sure how Treasurer Scott Morrison came up with the idea that "there is a new divide, the taxed and the taxed nots."

I thought the whole idea of the GST was to make sure poor people paid more tax.

It worked a treat with studies in 2009/10 showing that GST paid as a percentage of income for the lowest income householders is more than twice that of the highest income householders.

But maybe what Mr Morrison says is true if we take a look at the other end of the spectrum, company tax.

A recently invoked tax transparency measure, puts on public record the amount of tax paid by private companies that earn \$200 million or more in revenue each year.

Looking at the 321 compa-

nies that fit into that category during 2013 -14, a staggering 98 didn't pay any tax at all.

A further 100 pay tax of less than 1% of their total income and of that 321 companies only 18 paid tax of more than 4% of their total revenue and only 3 of those is over 10%.

You might think twice about going to Macca's when you learn that although they turned over nearly \$500 million, they paid no tax.

A West Australian cooperative paid no company tax in 2013 – 14 despite a more than \$3.4 billion revenue.

I get it that sometimes companies have a bad year and don't make a profit, but when I look at these figures I find it hard to believe that so many of the best business people could be doing that badly, year in year out. Yep, it's now clearer who the taxed-nots are.

JENNIE WILSON of the Butterfly House Drug Rehabilitation Centre may well have been right when she told the Gazette last month that Tasmania urgently needed a new residential drug treatment centre.

However, the answer is not to close the Ashley Youth Detention Centre and re-use the premises, as suggested by Trevor Reeve of the Salvation Army.

Ashley continues to serve its absolutely essential purpose as a secure facility for young people who have committed very serious crimes and cannot be dealt with in any other way. It is a last

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resort, and that's why it has so few inmates.

If there were no such place, those young criminals would either be held in the adult jail or not detained at all - both dangerous outcomes. Building a new youth detention centre, probably in the South, would achieve nothing and cost many millions.

So although those addressing the drug epidemic may see a tempting opportunity in "freeing up" Ashley for other uses, the temptation must be firmly resisted, because such a move would be harmful rather than helpful.

The drive contains malware and adware of various sorts which will harm your computer and may steal personal information.


So do not plug this drive in to any computer or device even if you have an anti-virus programme.



THE UPCOMING Westbury Rotary Club Car Show will showcase a wide range of vehicles this month, with a theme of 'Old and New or Anything on Wheels'.

The township's historic Village Green will play host to car enthusiasts of all persuasions, with a good mix of vintage and modern models represented.

Of special interest will be the display of a 1916 Model T Ford alongside a 2016, special edition, V8 Supercharged FGX XR8 Ford Sprint, highlighting a 100 year contrast of technology and style.

Despite the significant age gap, the Model T can still hold its own. Owners Rick and Judy Gelston can attest to its continuing prowess, having recently finished a 1000 km, 7 day journey from

Cape Grim to Cockle Creek via Golden Valley.

While 28 cars attempted the journey, it was one of only 14 vehicles to finish the route without assistance.

The Ford Sprint was acquired by owner David Frost in early August and is one of only 700 made for the Australian and New Zealand market. The limited edition model was pre-order only, with all 700 sold prior to being made.

Event organiser, Dave Lee, said the car show is set to become a great annual event; a family fun day where all are welcome.

The Car Show will be held on Sunday the 23rd of October with a 10.00am start, winding down at 2.00pm.

IN THE GARDEN WITH NELL CARR

"IN SPRING when the wattle gold trembles

Twixt shadow and shine, And each dew laden air draft resembles

A long draft of wine"

Adam Lindsay Gordon wrote this piece of hyperbole, when writing about the vegetation of his adopted country.

He went on to say that Australia was a "land of songless bright birds and scentless bright flowers", so it seems that his experience of the sounds and aromas of many of Australia's native species must have been seriously limited. In the months of July to October it would be hard to miss the native flowering acacias in the countryside, and even in home gardens.

Observers have noted the more than usually profuse blooming of Blackwood (Acacia melanoxylon) trees this year. These are prized as paddock trees by farmers as shelter belts for summer shade and winter protection for livestock, and also by builders. The dark red/brown timber of

Tasmanian Blackwood makes attractive house fittings. These trees live for between 90 and 100 years when they begin to die off limb by limb, but they are very easily propagated from seed to ensure continuity.

While the prolific Blackwood and Wattle trees are far too large for home gardens, there are several of smaller proportions which would enhance the shrub beds.

Acacia mucronata - Although quite tall, this species is a graceful slender tree which grows along the streams in the foothills of the Western Tiers, and should not be too intrusive in the native garden. Most Tasmanian Wattles are frost and drought resistant.

Vegetables. Most vegetables can be sown in October, but not onions. Later, some garden stores will have composite trays, containing in 6 separate pots Broccoli, Cauliflower, and Cabbage (two of each). Very useful for small households.



When Melanie Dennison (pictured) moved to Deloraine six years ago, she found it difficult to settle down and enjoy life in her new community.

Not knowing anyone she felt on the outside and missed chatting with friends over a cup of coffee.

That all changed just a few months ago, when Melanie discovered Meander Valley's University of the Third Age (U₃A) and started going to classes.

The 61-year-old took up yoga, Tai Chi and painting and enjoys it so much, that she is now on the organising committee and teaches a class of her own.

Sparkling with enthusiasm Melanie said that enrolling in U₃A had turned her life around and she is encouraging more people to try it out.

"U3A is an absolute godsend. I'm a different person," she said. "It's been a huge turnaround."

Sri Lankan by birth, Melanie has lived, studied and worked in Australia for a large part of her life.

In Brisbane she worked in administration in the Lord Mayor's office and life was

both busy and stimulating.

Tasmania had always featured in future plans for retirement, but the move came all too suddenly when her husband Victor (from Botswana) suffered a freak accident and fell onto a star picket when cycling.

The horrific incident and its life-changing scars left Victor unable to function to his normal capacity, so the couple fast forwarded their plans and moved to Deloraine.

Sparkling with enthusiasm Melanie said "that enrolling in U3A had turned her life around."

The gently undulating landscape suits Victor who has balance problems and can no longer drive.

But leaving friends, family and her work was harder on Melanie who craved more social interaction and the busyness she was used to. Regular trips back to Brisbane became the norm.

It was on one of these trips when a friend asked if there was U₃A anywhere close enough to attend, that Melanie discovered the Meander Valley U₃A, virtually in her own backyard! "I was so excited," she said. "I couldn't wait

to sign on.'

And since February this year her world has changed.

Delighting in her new lifestyle, Melanie now enjoys expanding her horizons as well as a regular get together with new friends.

She is eager for more people to take up a course at U₃A to enhance their lives, or if they have specialist skills, to come along and teach others.

To join U₃A you must be over 50 years old. Membership is a total of \$50.00 a year that covers any number of classes.

Meander Valley U3A and activities that are available, will be highlighted at Westbury during Seniors Week on Thursday 13th October from 2.00pm to 4.00pm.

Activities on the Village Green will include Croquet, Tai Chi and Petanque. There will also be wood working, art, mosaics and lino cutting at the Westbury RSL.



MATT BENDALL and David Doukidis arrived in Tasmania to take over ownership of Wychwood Gardens, just in time to see it disappearing under water.

"It was pretty dramatic, arriving on the morning of the floods," related Matt. "We lost trees and fences but compared to some other people we did fine."

Fast forward nearly four months later and, after a lot of hard work, the gardens are getting back to their pristine condition.

Matt and David purchased Wychwood after deciding they needed a change from Melbourne.

"I did not really want to be in an office anymore, not seeing any daylight," said David.

With a former house bursting at the seams with plants, they had looked around for their tree change property to build a nursery.

They first saw Wychwood as visitors in 2013 with no idea that one day it would belong to them.

Matt explains, "It is just the most amazing pocket of the world. Also the people have been so friendly. Our neighbours have been wonderful. You do not get that in Melbourne. People here generally care more."

Meander River, I'm crossing you in style

THE ROTARY CLUB of Deloraine, over the years, has provided many improvements for the Deloraine community. One of these projects has been the footbridges.

In 1991 the Rotary Club under the helm of Geoff McLennan and Community Service Director David Plumbridge commenced the planning and construction of the footbridge that links the Deloraine Apex Caravan Park to the redeveloped area on the Eastern side of the river, known as Rotary Park.

The bridge was designed and built in Tasmania with input from Don Howe and the expertise of Elphinstone Engineering Burnie. The bridge was finally put in place in 1993.

The cost of \$70,000 was fully funded by the Rotary Club of Deloraine and a further \$30,000 was spent on the boardwalks and paths to connect Rotary Park.

On completion, the bridge was handed over by Deloraine Rotary Club President, Michael Fahey, to the Deloraine Council to maintain...

With the full winter experience you can see the plant requirements – the dormancy they need, how they thrive," he added.

They are planning on building up a nursery specialising in rare plants; all growing in their natural environment, and eventually you will be able to purchase them.

Wychwood will also open at the end of October to visitors, offering complimentary tea or coffee. Running through to April, you can visit from Thursday to Monday, 10.00 am to 4.00 pm.

Matt elaborated, "Spend as long as you want here. Wander around, sit by the creek to enjoy the lovely gardens, the beautiful creek and spot the platypus."

David added, "If locals have family and friends visiting and want a nice place to take them that is close by, Wychwood is the place!"

Matt continued, "Most of all come and say hi. We have only just arrived and have not had a chance to say 'hello' to many people. Come chat.

And if you have any questions about plants, we will try to help you out."

With a clever blend of traditional and modern mark-making techniques, this year's entrants bring together new perspectives and stirringly familar scenes for a not-to-be missed exhibition.



Elm Leaf Beetle Program

Elm Leaf Beetles and their larvae can cause significant defoliation of Elms leaving the trees susceptible to other pests and disease. After sustained annual attacks by Elm Leaf Beetles, the tree's growth will be affected and the tree may eventually perish.

During October, Meander Valley Council will be conducting Elm Leaf Beetle treatments on Elm trees throughout the municipal

UTas students design Craft Fair entrance

TIM BIGGS, Director of the Tasmanian Craft Fair (TCF), in conjunction with students of the Architecture and Design School at the University of Tasmania (UTAS), have come up with an innovative drawcard for this year's fair.

Tim felt that TCF really needed a portal to set off the main entrance to the fair, approaching UTAS to ask if its students could deliver "something that people can walk through, and be whimsical enough to engage them".

He added, "It is a good collaboration as they are very enthusiastic and easy to work with. And it is a really good

experience for them, having to project manage to a budget and to justify what they are doing.

According to UTAS lecturer Mark Bagguley, designing a structure is a complex process, "Testing it is a mixture of digital and hands-on work."

A plywood portal was decided because the material is cheap and flexible.

Students design it digitally in an architecture program called Grasshopper, performing many physical tests on different plywood weaves, material thickness and bending stress, and building models with each step to work out the number of laminates they will need.

These real-world projects are very important for the students, as "some of them have not touched raw materials before.

"You have to understand how it is going to work from scale with the material. The main problem is the timber's wind load: how far can the material go before it starts to fracture, de-laminate and break?" related Mark.

Tim added, "TCF is funding the entrance portal, but as we raise money for community projects and charities, we would like to get some assistance if we can."

WHAT WOULD normally be a 15 minute drive from Deloraine now takes almost an hour. Dynans Bridge at Weegena was washed away by the June floods and is not expected to be repaired until December.

Along the way we see hundreds of acres of once beautiful pasture covered in rock, gravel and wood debris.

The Bridle Track road is washed out in many places making travel fairly slow.

Eventually we arrive at Grant Ellis's property at Weegena, right beside the washed out bridge.

"This is the worst I've seen," says BlazeAid Tasmanian Flood Coordinator Barry Thompson, looking across the amount of debris washed up on the once lush pastureland. "It looks like a logging coupe."

Barry also manages the Mole Creek BlazeAid camp and he has brought a crew of volunteers to assist Grant in re-establishing a boundary fence.

"This would not have got done until after we've got a new bridge," comments Grant.

Grant lost 21 head of cattle and his stockyards during the floods, but finds the pilfering that has been happening since even more devastating.

"The flood happened, we can't change that, but the fact that people come and

steal your things - that just a few have also come from gets brutal."

"I've got people coming in, with 4 wheel drives, going right up through the property and just taking whatever they want."

Barry, having experienced disaster situations in many areas of Australia says this behaviour is not uncommon. BlazeAid's focus of repairing and putting up boundary fences serves to minimise theft as well as keeping stock in.

The Mole Creek crew have had 38 volunteers since they set up on 14th July, most of them are Tasmanians but the mainland.

Some travel daily from "Jack from Launceston. Launceston has been with us since Day One," comments Barry, "and Dave, he's come all the way from Hobart."

Barry hails from Mt Gambier in South Australia but hasn't seen much of home recently having been there only four weeks since April of

"I was in Western Queensland doing drought relief and this happened."

BlazeAid volunteers work-

ing on the Tasmanian flood relief have been working from 4 camps: Ulverstone, Ouse, Port Sorrell and Mole Creek.

The Mole Creek crew have put up 20km of new fencing and repaired 15km.

They've worked on farms at Caveside, Liena, Weegena and Mole Creek.

"Property owners provide the materials and we provide the grunt," says Barry.

BlazeAid also provide tools. "I placed an order for six brand new trailers at Sunrise Trailers in Deloraine that will stay here in Tasmania for

next time" explains Barry.

Each trailer holds \$8,000 worth of gear.

Money to fund the operation comes from local fundraisers and donations from individuals and groups.

The Meander Valley Choir performed at a fundraiser in Westbury and the Deloraine Lions Club presented Barry with a cheque for \$10,500; \$500 of which came from Dungog in NSW where BlazeAid worked last year.

ATTHE end of Westbury Road in Prospect, there lies Richardson's Harley-Davidson store and Museum, and Tasmanian Motorcycle Warehouse. Next to those is a unique restaurant, one that brings an American flare to the area.

Originally the Tassie Devils Restaurant and Bar when it opened in 2008, the renamed Iron Horse Bar & Grill has continued to be popular with the locals and tourists.

Venue Manager since May, Guy Conolan, said that he enjoys working at the unique establishment.

"It has grown over the years and continues to be a fun place to visit," he said.

"Being that it's attached to a Harley-Davidson dealership and museum, it's themed around Harley-Davidson as an American style bar and grill atmosphere.

"Coming into summer we're looking at opening on Sunday afternoons as well and getting more live entertainment going.

Guy has a background working in five-star hotels, resorts and major tourist attractions in Queensland with a significant focus on guest service and engagement.

The restaurant is well decorated and looked after, with a Harley-Davidson V-Rod Destroyer Drag Bike, one of only a few hundred ever built, located above the bar.

The décor is from owner Simon Hrycyszyn's private collection and many of the bar items such as the stools and Harley-Davidson bar paraphernalia were imported from the USA.

"One of the things we like to focus on is being a family friendly environment with the restaurant and entertainment," Mr Conlan said.

"Located right next to the highway, we get a lot of passers-by coming in to check out the dealership and museum and staying for a meal, as well as plenty of regular guests."

Iron Horse is popular for birthday parties, work functions, dinner, or just drop in for a few beers and a game on the eight ball table.

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

...and control. A second bridge was erected in 2005 across the Meander River below the weir by the Rotary Club of Deloraine to complete the pathway circuit around the riverbank.

The funding for this bridge was predominantly provided by the Rotary Club of Deloraine from proceeds of the Tasmanian Craft Fair, apart from a Grant of \$10,000.

Over the years the Rotary Club has also provided funds and performed working bees to upgrade the riverbank pathways in conjuction with the Meander Valley Council.



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
