on fun, all-inclusive events in the Meander Valley, and the next event on the cards is a Hollywood themed Trivia Night, with the date yet to be decided.



Chemotherapy is the first line of treatment (which Oscar has commenced), and ongoing treatment can last for up to 3 years.

Oscar's full treatment plan will be determined as things progress, but we do know that things will not be easy.

Oscar, a fun, cheeky, witty, 4-year-old is the son and grandson of long term, local residents.

He was due to start Kinder at Our Lady Of Mercy back in February but has only been able to attend a couple of part days having spent most of February in the Royal Hobart Hospital, undertaking invasive tests and specialist appointments to gain a diagnosis and has since required ongoing hospitalisation for treatment.



#### **LOCAL VET UNDERSTAFFED?** Dear Editor,

Around 20 minutes past midnight on May 19, we called the local Deloraine Vet - the afterhours service - for an emergency with our little Jack Russell Jaffa.

We left a message saying she was vomiting blood and needed urgent attention.

The automated message said if we had not heard back within half an hour to call again so we grabbed Jaffa and drove down to the vet centre to wait outside.

No one replied within the half hour so we called again and the on-call vet answered the phone.

The vet asked what was wrong. We said Jaffa had been quite unsettled for a couple of hours and had vomited on my bed with small blood clots in the frothy vomit. The vet asked when it had started and I explained we had driven back from Cygnet Monday afternoon and Jaffa had vomited once in the car just outside of Bothwell and been very quiet compared to her normal self.

Once home she had just slept all evening and did not eat any food nor take any water. We couldn't confirm if she had vomited any more as she had gone outside a couple times and then back to bed.

The vet then said she would prefer if we could bring Jaffa in when the clinic opened in the morning and were we aware there was an on-call cost.

We were quite shocked and said the cost was not a problem.

The vet said she did not think Jaffa would get any worse before morning as it had obviously been happening for some time, but asked us if we would prefer her to see Jaffa immediately.

Of course we said yes, but the vet replied that she was very tired and had hardly any sleep all weekend and she would prefer us bring her into the clinic in the morning when they open.

I hung up and found immediate assistance with an on-call vet in Launceston (mind you after waiting half hour for the on-call vet in Deloraine with an extra 35 minute drive to Launceston it was app 1.40am).

He met us at the clinic, examined Jaffa and put her immediately on a drip with antibiotics. She was very dehydrated and an anal examination showed blood all over his finger.

She remained on a drip for the rest of the night and all day

Tuesday with a diagnosis of hemorrhagic gastroenteritis.

The vet in Launceston said he was so glad we brought her in when we did, because she would have been most likely dead if we had waited.

We would not call after hours if we did not consider it an emergency, and while Jaffa may not have been a priority for the on-call vet, she is extremely important to us.

My partner worked as a pathology scientist for 25 years and was on a rotating on-call roster.

How would the vet have felt if she came into A&E vomiting blood and the doctor said they were too tired to come in to run the tests and cross match blood for transfusion because they had too many calls that weekend?

## **Response to Ashley site decision**

ON MAY 5, the Tasmanian Government ended two-anda-half years of hotly contested prison site preparation work Westbury when it near found that the Ashley Youth Detention Centre is the more suitable location.

Due diligence investigations are underway and the intention is to turn Ashley into a maximum security prison with a focus on rehabilitation and reintegration.

Community consultation with Ashley's nearby residnets found that a slim majority is opposed to the location, citing concerns including local safety, property values, traffic volume and the stigma for Deloraine and surrounds.

Meander Valley Council and Westbury Region Against the Prison Inc (WRAP) released statements regarding the decision and what this means for the region going forward.



Ashley Youth Detention Centre was set to close its doors in 2024, but the site may find new life as the state government considers it for the proposed Northern Correctional Facility.

### Prison announcement provides more certainty for the Meander Valley community

THE ANNOUNCEMENT by the Tasmanian Government to investigate the suitability of the Ashley Youth Detention Centre site for a northern correctional facility provides further certainty for Meander Valley residents.

Mayor Wayne Johnston said Council would continue to focus on ensuring the community was kept informed throughout the process.

"Council is encouraged to hear that there has been a strong

response to the Government's community consultation process with a large number of our residents providing feedback through various avenues," Mayor Johnston said.

proposal away from the Westbury region brings an end to WRAP's campaign.


The amenity and character of our town have been preserved, not just through our efforts but because the two sites we campaigned against were bottom of the barrel choices.

## Waste management overhaul

MEANDER VALLEY Council is leading the charge for sustainable waste management in the Valley.

Council has announced a suite of changes to waste services to secure a more sustainable future for the municipality.

"We are making these announcements before the finalisation of Meander Valley's new Waste Management Strategy to give residents time to prepare for the changes, which are significant," Mayor Wayne Johnston said.

Council is making a substantial investment in waste management to provide more sustainable and cost effective services longer term.

"Importantly, we are taking this step ahead of the introduction of the State Government's waste levy, so we can minimise the costs to our ratepayers," Mayor Johnston said.

From July 1, the State Government will be charging a levy on the amount of waste going to landfill. Commencing at \$20 per tonne, the levy is set to increase to \$40 per tonne by 2024 and then \$60 per tonne by 2027.

Currently, 50 percent of

Meander Valley's kerbside waste by weight is made up of food and organic waste with a further 15 percent made up of misplaced recyclable material.

"By improving how we divert these products we can reduce the impact of the waste levy for our ratepayers and improve our sustainability at the same time" Mayor Johnston said.

"Over the coming months, we will be expanding our collection of food organics and garden organics (FOGO) and waste and recycling collection services in a staged approach where it is cost effective to do so. It's an exciting step towards our long term sustainability and we will be working hard to support our residents throughout this transition."

Meander Valley Council's waste management overhaul mirrors the direction of a number of local councils who are faced with the rising financial and environmental costs of landfill.

Mayor Johnston said the new services will bring big benefits, but they do rely on everyone establishing good waste habits.

"Every resident has a part to play, particularly when it comes to sorting. We want every householder to become a sorting champion and we will be measuring the success of our sorting post pick up," Mayor Johnston said.

Sorting and avoiding cross contamination of bins is important as a misplaced item can lead to entire truckload being sent to landfill.

"By just being "good sorts" we can save at least 1300 tonnes of waste going to landfill across our local government area every year and that's significant," Mayor Johnston said.

From July, an additional 3,456 households across Prospect Vale, Hadspen and Traveller's Rest will be joining Blackstone Heights in receiving a FOGO collection service.

This is in addition to 47 rural property owners in serviceable areas who have opted in to receive a new waste and recycling collection, leading to additional diversion of recyclables from landfill.

Continuing the practice started last year, Meander Valley Council will also be providing waste vouchers to certain areas of the municipality.

"A one size fits all approach to waste is far too narrow for Meander Valley. Our

municipality is made up of very diverse communities and is geographically vast. Waste vouchers are a direct measure to support those residents who need to travel longer distances to access a waste facility," Mayor Johnston said. Ahead of the changes, residents will soon be receiving more information about their new bin collection days as well as educational packs to help them to effectively use their new waste services.

"We will have resources available and Council staff will be here to help support everyone throughout this transition. We look forward to building better waste services as we work towards reducing our landfill.

## **Better Together: National Volunteer Week 2022**

MEANDER VALLEY Connect Inc. had the opportunity to recognise the vital work of our volunteers at the Deloraine and Mole Creek Online Access Centres as part of National Volunteer Week celebrations 16-22 May – and, most importantly, to say thank you for the work they do in helping to build digital literacy in our communities.

The volunteer-led Centres, which are funded by Libraries Tasmania, have been serving our communities since 1998, providing invaluable access to digital technology, advice and training to those who don't have access to equipment or the skills to digitally engage.

It can be difficult to keep up with the rapid changes in new technology and different platforms required by government, business and industry, and access isn't always easy – in fact, TasCOSS identified Meander Valley as one of 28 communities in Tasmania as having "digital inclusion disadvantage", with 23.1% of households in Deloraine and Westbury unable to access the internet from home.

Apart from enabling access to the internet and free Wi-Fi, the Centres are a 'one-stop shop', with volunteers performing a range of invaluable services, from providing general advice on IT applications and mobile phones, to printing, scanning and helping set up email accounts.

There are also training opportunities for those who would like to stretch their digital skills even further, and gaming on Saturday evenings at Deloraine if you like to challenge your technical skills and imagination.

According to Communities Tasmania, volunteering is Tasmania's largest sector, larger than both the private and government sectors, with approximately 300,000 Tasmanians contributing a staggering \$4 billion in benefits to the state in 2019 - but there's also a 'feel-good factor' for the volunteer.

Research shows that giving to others can bring about a sense of purpose and greater connection, reducing stress and stimulating better mental health.

While volunteering is a powerful way to build more resilient and connected communities, and for individuals to build networks, skills and gain experience, often it is the motivation to 'give back' that drives people to volunteer.

Long-standing Deloraine Online Access Centre volunteer, Sandra, who has volunteered at the Centre for more than 20 years, said, "I enjoy helping others and keeping my skills alive.

If you don't use it, you lose it, especially when it comes to technology.

And you meet lots of interesting people, too."

The Centres could not operate without the dedication and skills of these committed volunteers, who are always happy to help.


The brigade is comprised completely of volunteers who have work and family commitments, but still manage to find time to protect their community.

## New rules for close contacts

If you have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19, you are no longer required to quarantine. However, for 7 days from being told you are a close contact, you must:

- Take a test as soon as you find out you are a close contact, again on day 6 and on each day that you leave your home.
- Notify your workplace.
- Wear a mask indoors (not required in your own home).
- **Do not enter high-risk settings** such as hospitals and aged care facilities, unless you require urgent care, or are a critical worker with an exemption.
- If you develop COVID-19 symptoms, you must stay at home. If you test positive you must still isolate for at least 7 days.

## **More irrigation water for Greater Meander**

TASMANIAN IRRIGATION is delighted to have opened Water Sales for a very exciting 11,000 megalitre augmentation of the Greater Meander Irrigation District.

highly-anticipated This project has been designed to upgrade pump intakes, extend existing pipelines, construct new pipelines and renew the Cheshunt drainage channel, resulting in improved water allocation reliability, increased water allocation licences and reduced maintenance costs.

Additional high-surety irrigation water is planned to be extracted from riparian flows and delivered to landowners via new pipeline, and water could be delivered for the first time to a new area of prime agricultural land located north east of the Bass Highway near Deloraine. The scope also includes possible pipeline extensions for Caveside, Rubicon, Quamby and Hagley.

Tasmanian Irrigation Chief Executive Officer Andrew Kneebone said a total of 11,000 megalitres of new water could be delivered to the region if sufficient demand through the Water Sales process is registered.

"This is a pivotal moment in time for the district," Mr Kneebone said.

"For the next six weeks, farmers in these areas will be able to contractually apply for water entitlements as part of this important Water Sales process.

"Across Tasmanian Irrigation's existing and proposed irrigation schemes, we are seeing record levels of interest in this reliable irrigation water.

"In the Greater Meander area, we have farmers continually asking for more water to expand their agricultural businesses focused on berries, dairy, vegetables, poppies, nuts and pasture for livestock finishing.

"This additional irrigation water will ensure new and existing primary industries are supported, creating more jobs and underpinning millions of dollars' worth of expansion and value adding."

The Meander Dam was constructed in November 2007 as the centrepiece of the existing 28,800 megalitre irrigation scheme that services Carrick, Caveside, Chudleigh, Plains, Deloraine, Dairy Dunorlan, Elizabeth Town, Exton, Hagley, Meander, Osmaston and Montana, Westbury.

Mr Kneebone sincerely thanked the Australian Government for its \$5 million contribution toward the upgrade, as well as irrigators for investing in new water and the entitlements, Tasmanian Government for its \$2 million for an upgrade of

the Meander mini hydro power station.

"The public / private funding model adopted for irrigation infrastructure across Tasmania has delivered 15 new irrigation schemes and a further 10 are currently being planned. We are delighted that Water Sales are also open for the Tamar Irrigation Scheme and Sassafras Wesley Vale Irrigation Scheme Augmentation.

"This is a very exciting time for agriculture in Tasmania."

# Former school to be community house

acknowledged and thanked the efforts of the Meander community in working together to find a new operator for the former Meander Primary School.

The process has reached another milestone with Councillors accepting the Community Shortlisting Group's recommendation on a preferred option going forward with a proposal to establish a Meander House, based around and operated by the long running and successful Deloraine House.

Mayor Wayne Johnston said it was a welcome milestone in the process to find a tenant for the former school and Council was now in a position to progress through the next stage of negotiating a lease and arrangements to work with the community.

"It's great to be able to reach the stage where we can work with a potential new operator to give the former school a new lease on life," Mayor Johnston said.

"Council wants to thank members of the Meander community for coming along to our consultation events and giving us feedback on what they would like to see happen at the former school site.

"We particularly want to recognise members of the Community Shortlisting Group who have given up their time to ensure we get a good outcome for the community from this process."

The Community Shortlisting Group has supported the proposal by Deloraine House Inc to establish a satellite house called Meander House which would deliver services and support to vulnerable individuals and families in the greater Meander community.

The proposal would also allow community members to

use part of the site for events and other activities.

"Councillors this week discussed the recommendation put forward by the Community Shortlisting Group and is satisfied the proposal by Deloraine House Inc meets the expectations of the community and also ticks all the boxes for Council," Mayor Johnston said.

"A key factor was the willingness of Deloraine House to work with the community and support use of parts of the site for community activities and events.

"We now need to draft up a lease agreement which clearly reflects these expectations so that any new proposal can operate in the Meander community effectively into the future."

The new lease will form the basis of a formal decision on the proposal which will come before Council in June. **TOOSEY** Caring for our community

## ANZAC Day gift for Deloraine RSLA

CONSTRUCTED IN early WW2 in Sydney, a Bathurst classed Corvette was named after Deloraine.

On January 20, 1942 off Darwin Harbour she was given instructions to follow a course to a suspected sighting of an enemy submarine.

At 1.35pm upon arriving at the given co-ordinates, she was greeted with a sighting of an enemy torpedo quickly approaching the ship.

She immediately swung astern and narrowly avoided the attack by 10 feet.

Moments later a good echo





contact was obtained and she retaliated by swiftly dropping a pattern of six depth charges.

Success was assumed when the submarine briefly broke the surface along with multiple huge air bubbles followed by large continuous slicks of oil.

Nevertheless the attack continued until Deloraine had expended all her charges and she was joined by two other ships before she went to re-load and return in the early morning.

She obtained a second contact and dropped a further

#### series of charges.

Post war investigations showed that the first attack was successful and HMAS Deloraine.

Katoomba, Lithgow and Edsall were all officially credited with destroying the Japanese Submarine I-124 (a vessel of 1142 tons).

On June 28, 1977 a decleration was signed establishing the remains of the I-124 a historic shipwreck.

To commemorate the 80 year

anniversary of the decleration, a virtual reality video was made detailing the remains. The video can be found on YouTube at www.youtube. com/watch?v=mHlySgpCEso The full framed article, which was given to the club by Don Simpson, can be read in the bar.

Two scale models of the HMAS Deloraine J232 and photos of the ship, the original ship's bell and helm are proudly displayed in the bar as well.

### Northern Correctional Facility Project Update

On 9 September 2021, the Tasmanian Government announced the closure of the Ashley Youth Detention Centre (AYDC) within the next three years. As many in the community have stated, the closure of AYDC presented the Government with an opportunity to consider the development of this important infrastructure project at this location. Preliminary investigations of the AYDC site undertaken by the Department of Justice indicated that the site appears to be well suited as a location for a modern, fit for purpose correctional facility in northern Tasmania, with a custodial facility already a permitted use within the current zoning of the site under the Tasmanian Planning Scheme for the Meander Valley.

The Tasmanian Government made a clear commitment to engage with the local Meander Valley community on the future use of the AYDC site before making any decision. The primary purpose of this consultation was to provide an opportunity for the Meander Valley and wider Tasmanian community to express their views on the potential use of the AYDC site for the Northern Correctional Facility (NCF), and to provide an overview of those views to the Government to help inform a decision on the future use of the site.

The Government, through the Department of Justice Project Team (the Project Team), worked hard to engage as many members of the Meander Valley community as possible during their consultation processes. This included a bulk mail out to over 6,000 delivery points through Australia Post, direct contact with near neighbours of the site (namely those owning property within a 2km radius from the site), nine print media advertisements in local newspapers, direct marketing from the Department of Justice with 140 emails forwarded to subscribers, and materials advertising the community consultation provided to local businesses and government offices.

The community consultation included shop front/drop-in sessions held at several locations over a five week period, which commenced in early February 2022 and included day, evening and weekend sessions to maximise the opportunity for members of the local community to attend a session to have their say. A total of **143** people attended these drop-in sessions across Deloraine, Westbury and Elizabeth Town. In addition to these face-to-face meetings, a total of **125** written submissions were received, and these included feedback forms provided at the drop-in sessions, e-submissions and postal submissions.

We thank all community members who provided valuable feedback and participated in the drop-in sessions over the course of this extensive consultation process. Overall, feedback provided at the drop-in sessions and through the written submissions reflect a diverse range of views. The consultation process has provided a comprehensive overview of community attitudes within the Meander Valley to the possible use of the AYDC site for the NCF. It is also clear that, for a proposal of this nature, there is an encouraging level of community support for the AYDC site with informative suggestions to be considered as the possible site for the NCF.

Following the feedback received from the Meander Valley community consultation process, and given what is currently understood about the AYDC site in terms of its potential suitability for the NCF, the Tasmanian Government has confirmed that the AYDC site is now the only site being considered for the NCF and they will halt the work being conducted at the Crown Land site at Birralee Road.

Therefore, the Project Team will now commence full project planning, including due diligence investigations. This will include extensive investigations into the service infrastructure needs at the AYDC site including access to water, sewage and telecommunications. It will also encompass the potential traffic impact of the NCF's operations and how these traffic impacts could be effectively managed. As part of the further site due diligence, the Project Team will continue to engage with local landholders and the local community.

A key part of the Government's Corrections and Rehabilitation infrastructure plan is a commitment to build a NCF. The NCF will be a modern correctional facility that will not only provide secure and safe accommodation and facilities for the offender population it houses and staff working there, but one with a strong focus on providing rehabilitation and reintegration opportunities for offenders.

## **Delicious winter warmer**

WINTER IS certainly upon us. Woollen jumpers, padded jackets, beanies and gumboots have again become standard wear and homes have the clothes horse firmly positioned in front of the heater.

Many readers will have resurrected their soup pots and slow cookers.

Swedish Style Meatballs in Mushroom Sauce makes perfect winter fare.

Although I cook this recipe in an electric fry pan, I'm sure it would be equally successful cooked in your slow cooker.

The meatballs are rather fragile and tend to stick to the bottom of the pan when browning, so refrigerate them as long as possible before frying and turn them very carefully.

You can use any type of minced meat for this recipe and can use either fresh or dried breadcrumbs.

You will need slightly less cream if you use fresh breadcrumbs.

Serve over creamy mashed potato and sprinkle with freshly chopped dill if you have it growing in your garden.



#### Swedish Style Meatballs in Mushroom Sauce

#### Meatball Ingredients

- 3/4 C 1 C breadcrumbs
- 500g pork and veal mince
- about 1/3 C cream to moisten
- a big pinch of nutmeg
- 1 onion grated
- 1 egg lightly beaten
- pepper and salt to taste
- 3 Tb. olive oil for frying

#### **Sauce Ingredients**

- 2 Tb butter
  400g of button mushrooms

  sliced
- 1 onion peeled and chopped
- 3 or 4 cloves of garlic
   crushed
- 2 Tb flour

.

- 2 3 Tb Dijon mustard
- 1 ts turmeric
- 1C 2C of water
- 1 large chicken stock cube
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Fresh chopped dill to serve
- (optional)

#### **Meatball Method**

- **1.** Mix all the meatball ingredients together. Roll into small balls and refrigerate as long as possible.
- **2.** Brown the meatballs in hot olive oil.
- **3.** Remove meatballs from the pan and set aside while you make the sauce.

#### Sauce Method

- 1. In the same pan, melt the butter and add the onion, mushrooms and garlic. Cook until soft and lightly browned.
- **2.** Stir in the flour, mustard, crumbled stock cube and turmeric.
- **3.** Gently stir in about 1 C of water and bring to the boil. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- **4.** Place the meatballs back into the pan on top of the sauce and simmer very gently until meatballs are cooked through.
- **5.** Add more water when necessary and stir very gently when needed.



DELORAINE TABLE Tennis League member Rohan Eastley competed recently at the 2022 Paraquad Boccia State Titles in Hobart.

Boccia is one of the fastest growing Paralympic sports.

Rohan made the bronze medal game (BC3 category) against Heath Mollinaeux (Hobart).

The match was very exciting. Rohan and Heath tied over the 4 ends. In the tiebreak end, their closest bowls were both the same distance from the white 'jack' so it went to a second tiebreak end, which Heath won.

The gold medal went to Dana Devine (Launceston), and silver to Eliza King (Hobart).

In the BC1&2 category, the gold medal went to Jason Mayweather (Queensland), silver to Coreena Harrison (Canberra), and bronze to Nick Milner (Tasmania).

In the BC4 & 5 & EMU category, the gold medal went to Axil Pavey (NSW), silver to Mathew von Hoek (NSW), and bronze to Minna Blaney (Tasmania).

Rowan was delighted with his first competition, and now has his sights set on representing Australia at the next Paralympics.

"I am a University student at UTAS and I live in Deloraine. I also have Cerebral Palsy (CP). I hope to one day represent Australia at the Paralympics. I'm very happy with my performance and very much looking forward to my next competition," Rohan said.

Competition Boccia is for athletes who require a wheelchair because of their disability. But social Boccia can be played by anyone (as long as they are seated).

Rowan was delighted to discover that he could play Boccia in his home town, "I am so happy to have discovered that Deloraine inclusion table tennis also includes Boccia."

Inclusion table tennis and Boccia is run by Deloraine Table Tennis League, in partnership with Delgunyah (the Den), and with generous support from the Deloraine Lions club and Westbury Health.

It is on every Tuesday from 3.15 to 5 pm, at the Meander Valley Performing Arts Centre ("the Little Theatre").

Inclusion table tennis and Boccia is for people of all ages and abilities, who enjoy playing together and having fun.

## Rodent poisons are doing more damage than you think

YOU'RE PROBABLY aware of the effectiveness of rodenticides (rodent poison) in keeping your home pest freebut are you aware that some of these poisons are absorbed by the predators who feed on rodents, causing disastrous effects in our ecosystems?

Second Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides (SGARs/Gen 2) poisons have increased in popularity in recent years due to their ability to kill rodents in just one dosewhich is great for us, but not so great for the environment and our ecosystem.

These hugely concentrated levels of poison easily work their way up the food chain when rodents are eaten by predators such as eagles, hawks, owls, devils, quollsand even domestic pets. In a 2021 study, it was found that a whopping 74% of eagles examined had some level of rodenticide in their systems.

As the colder months approach, rodents are looking for shelter- and you may find yourself with a few unwelcome rodent guests in your home. So, if rodenticides are causing harm to our ecosystem, what other options do you have for pest control?

As always, prevention is better than cure. Avoid leaving food scraps/pet food in accessible areas, keep your yard free of fruit fallen from trees, and ensure your home is secure with no entry points for mice or rats (if your little finger can fit, so can a mouse!). Before you rush to buy poisons, you can also consider manual rat traps.

However, if you find yourself in a situation where poisons are necessary, opt for first generation poisons with the active ingredients warfarin or coumatetralyl. While first generation (Gen 1) poisons take multiple doses to kill rats, they have a lesser impact on the animals which prey on them.

If a poison contains dangerous chemicals such as bromadiolone, it is legally required to be labelled 'POISON'. If its ingredients are less toxic, it will be labelled 'CAUTION'. This distinction is very important, and will help you identify which products are best to use. While no poison is always the best option, if it is needed, opt for those with a 'caution' label.

The warning label can be found at the top of the packaging.

So remember:

- Opt for prevention and manual traps for the least environmental damage
- If necessary to buy poisons, look for those with active ingredients like warfarin and coumatetralyl, or those which contain sodium chloride.
- Always avoid poisons labelled 'one dose action' or 'one kill'. These are second generation poisons which have long lasting effects in the ecosystem.
- The most toxic rodenticides will be labelled 'POISON.' Avoid these products. CAUTION is better than POISON
