MEANDER VALLEY Council is supporting young people in the region to provide input into local action to address climate change and participate in community events ranging from Winter Fire, the Climate change forum and Youth Arts Alliance activities.

The Youth Arts Alliance is presenting a series of inclusive

activities and workshops in craft, music and circus at the Meander Valley Performing Arts Centre (Little Theatre) on 14 October 2022.

These activities will be followed by an evening concert featuring local bands DelTime Killers and the Stingrays.

The Climate Change Youth Forum, held on 3 September

in Westbury, attracted young people right across the municipality from Prospect Vale to Kimberley.

Initiated by Councillor Deborah White, the forum aimed to give young people the opportunity to take a lead in helping to address some of the issues locally.

Attendees presented to

a Council workshop on 27 September to share ideas generated from the forum on ways the community can take positive steps in response to climate change.

Council will be looking to continue encouraging youth and community action through a new youth participation project set to be delivered in 2023.

The project is funded by the State Government and will focus the community on supporting young people to access and actively participate within community programs as an important contributor to their wellbeing.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

COUNCIL ELECTIONS

The corflutes are up!

Candidates for the Meander Valley Council elections have been pouring over population statistics to consider how many votes they need? Where can I get them? How do I get attention and stand out? And what issues will work, and where?

About 16,000 people over the age of 18 will be eligible to vote in this year's mandatory election, with nearly half of all eligible voters aged over 50 years.

People who need assistance to complete postal votes can contact Council to book a time after 17 October.

Voting is compulsory so it is more important than ever to be familiar with the candidates.

Political party endorsed candidates and informal interest / issue-based teams are emerging in this years elections.

There are no problems with parties or teams per se, but a small group of aligned councillors could block progress.

In addition, strongly held views on an issue or party endorsement which carries a position on an issue, could neutralise a councillor who may be excluded from voting on that issue because of a conflict of interest or bias.

Council decisions can not be made in the best interest of particular interest groups or political parties.

Today, Councils operate like a board of management: making majority decisions in the best interests of residents, informed by expert advice and policy, and within the bounds of legislation.

Historically boards have been populated by white, middle-class men, but modern boards recognise the critical importance of members of different genders and ages, with diverse skillsets from a broad range of social backgrounds.

The broader electoral base for these elections may pivot councils more towards wellbeing and social justice based issues such as homelessness, antiracism and impacts of climate change.

Elected councillors have three main roles.

The first role is to govern: to act in accordance with the Code of Conduct, to make informed decisions on the overall direction and priorities of the council, oversee the development and implementation of projects, and monitor budgets and progress of plans.

The second role, probably the most contentious, is to act as a member of the local planning authority. Councillors make decisions regarding the compliance of planning applications with the local planning scheme in accordance with the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993.

In some cases, councillor's decisions on applications that are compliant with the legislation may not be popular with the community.

Finally, the third, but most time consuming and rewarding role, is to advocate for and represent local constituents.

Councillors are elected for four years, so it's useful to think about how your chosen candidates will contribute to decision making that affects your street, town, community and environment over that period. Four years is a long time if you "misvote."

We must also be mindful of the areas where we are allowed to be, and where we are not.

As noted on the Meander

Valley Council website, dogs are not permitted on playing fields within the municipality, so the football / cricket oval at the recreation ground is out of bounds for all dogs.

We can still walk around the outside of it, just not on the playing area.

Another such area we are currently permitted to use is the Westbury Showground, but this is private property, owned and maintained (without

council assistance) by the Westbury Agricultural Society.

The dumper bin that is located inside the gate is not there for disposal of dog waste or to leave bags of dog excreta on the lids.

Please do the right thing so that we may all continue to enjoy the outdoors with our four-legged friends.

Through the VeteranHub, we plan to embed a system of early engagement with veterans that provides a continuum of care.

Many younger veterans are not yet engaged in ex service organisations.

We would particularly like to encourage younger veterans and ex-service members to make contact and ideally put themselves forward as members, particularly in a committee role with potentially fresh ideas moving forward.

It is not an onerous undertaking, but to survive and thrive as a RSL Sub Branch to continue our vital work, we would love to see some new faces, both men and women.

ON 1 October, Deloraine House and Meander Valley Council celebrated the signing of a new lease over the former Meander School site.

The lease expires in 2027, with the option to renew the lease for two additional 5 year terms, providing some certainty to Deloraine House to plan for long term.

A new neighbourhood house, Meander House, is planned to provide community support to residents of Meander and surrounding areas.

It will provide information and referral support, internet access via a computer, help filling in government forms, act as an agent for the No Interest Loans Scheme, and access to telehealth.

A free hot shower and laundry facilities are also being planned, plus emergency food relief as an agency for Salvation Army Doorways program.

It will also provide opportunities for social interaction through a community garden and other spaces for the community events.

Meander House will open in November. Potential volunteers and those interested in contributing to planning/ operations should contact Darren Harris, Deloraine House

There were also celebrations up the road at the Meander Bridge Café which has reopened after 16 long weeks of renovations.

Taking new patients at Deloraine and Westbury centres

Deloraine and Westbury Medical Centres

DELORAINE AND Westbury Medical are taking new patients at both sites with a fee for the first visit and then bulk billed after that (some procedures excluded).

It includes a visit with the nurse to update details, update our clinical software and then the gp for the consultation.

Recruitment and retention of doctors in rural areas has been in the papers recently and it is a continuing hardship for practices in rural areas, such as Deloraine and Westbury.

We have attended many different reviews with government officials, local council members and other governing authorities to try and work on a solution to this problem.

Unfortunately, it is a combination of doctors and families not wanting to live outside major cities, their families having to establish new relationships in a new community, work life imbalances due to working on call,

as well as with the local hospital and nursing homes.

D&WMC have worked extremely hard to recruit more doctors to our area increasing the number of doctors at our practice, we now have twelve GPs, although several are only part time.

At Deloraine we have extended our services to the community with extended hours opening later Wednesday and Friday nights until 7.30pm, plus the Saturday morning clinic.

We have plans to hopefully increase that even more in the

coming months to three days per week Monday, Wednesday and Friday 7.30am - 7.30pm, plus the normal Saturday.

At Westbury we have increased the number of doctors working from there and now have three doctors most days to help alleviate the shortage of GPs in Westbury and are planning to increase the services offered there as well.

We hope the community continues to show its support, giving our new doctors a warm welcome.

Was there the UK equivalent of the CWA coming to the rescue with cups of tea and ham sandwiches?


Was there a welfare organisation handing out blankies to stave off the cold?



Weetbix Date Loaf

AS I flip through my old recipe books and folders, I come across many recipes identified by the name of the person who shared them.

Nancy's Apple Blossom Cakes, Aunty Freda's Meringue Heather's Sausage Casserole to name but a few.

Many of my go-to recipes came from family, friends, colleagues and even past students. Each recipe has a bit of story and I can often recall the specific event or occasion which lead to the recipe being shared.

Modern recipe books rarely seem to aknowledge the origin of the contents but I'm sure that many contain recipes gleened from others that have been tweaked and renamed.

This month's recipe comes from my neighbour.

Pat's Weetbix Date Loaf is easy to make, freezes well and is even more moist if kept in an airtight container for a few days before slicing and buttering.

One thing I know for sure is that food always tastes better when someone else makes it!

Pat's Weetbix Date Loaf

Ingredients

- 3 Weetbix crushed
- 1C Chopped dates
- 1/2C brown sugar
- 50 g butter chopped
- bicarbonate of soda scant
- 1C boiling water
- 1 C self raising flour
- ½ C 1 C of chopped pecans or walnuts (optional)

Method

- 1 Grease and line a loaf tin with paper.
- 2 Preheat oven to 180C.
- 3 Pour boiling water over the crushed Weetbix, chopped dates, butter, brown sugar and bicarbonate of soda.



- 4 Allow to cool for about 15 minutes until the butter has melted. Stir occasionally.
- **5** Gently mix in the flour (and nuts if using) with a metal spoon.
- 6 Spoon into prepared loaf tin and bake for 30 – 45 minutes or until judged cooked when tested with a skewer.

At the movies with the **Western Tiers Film Society**

Our October film is loosely based on Jack London's 1909 semi-autobiographical novel, 'Martin Eden'.

London writes passionately about the great questions of life and death and the struggle to survive with dignity and integrity.

His stories of high adventure (Call of the Wild, White Fang, Sea Wolf) were based on his own experiences at sea, in the Yukon Territory, and in the fields and factories of California, and the resulting novels appeal to millions worldwide.

Though he wrote about adventure, he also sought peace and quiet inspiration. His spiritual retreat, Glen Ellen, on the slope of Sonoma Mountain is now known as Jack London Home and Ranch and is both a California Historical Landmark and a National Historic Landmark.

"All I wanted," said London, "was a quiet place in the country to write and loaf in and get out of Nature that something which we all need. only the most of us don't know it."

London, a colourful. controversial personality, was considered a living symbol of rugged individualism who was quick to side with the underdog against injustice of any kind.

He was an eloquent public speaker and was much sought after as a lecturer on socialism and other economic and political topics. He ascribed his worldwide literary success largely to hard work - to "dig", as he put it.

In 1914 Jack was a war correspondent in Mexico, covering the role of US troops and Navy ships in the Villa-Carranza revolt.

His untimely death in 1916 at age 40, was reported by the San Francisco Bulletin: 'No writer, unless it were Mark Twain, ever had a more romantic life than Jack London.'

Beyond daffodills - celebrating the lesser known Spring bulbs

THE DAFFODILS this spring have been spectacular with sheets of gold regaling us at every turn.

Wordsworth would have been inspired! But one can reach a saturation point with golden daffodils and it might be time to look at some of the quieter and more dainty spring bulbs available.

These are some of my favourites.

Snowdrop (Galanthus nivalis)

Don't confuse these with the tall snowflake (Leucojum aestivum).

The true snowdrop is a smaller gem with a more complex white flower tipped with green.

It is an early flowerer, multiplies readily and is famously divided and moved "in the green."

Chinodoxa (Scilla forbesii)

The twentieth century English Beverley Nichols, writer, wanted his country cottage rock garden to display a "waterfall of Chinodoxa" in spring.

I admire his ambition when for me Chinodoxa is shy and fleeting but the true blue of its colouring is exquisite.

The plant is quite small and easily overcrowded but the colour is unmatched.

There is a pink version which is washed out and sadly disappointing.

Trillium (Trillium spp)

As its name would suggest, everything is in threes - three leaves, three petals and a threepart pistil.

There are varying sizes and colours and they make a dramatic statement.

Fritillaries (Fritillaria spp)

I have three species, including the chequered F. megealaris which is very easy to grow and multiplies well from

I've planted it around an herbaceous perennial as it grows and flowers before the perennial gets going.

I haven t found the Crown Imperial fritillary yet which is tall and magnificent.

One day perhaps...

Erythronium spp.

It can be called Trout lily or Dogs-tooth violet but neither name really describes it.







The Meander Valley needs to be known nationally for its own qualities, not simply as a little-known appendage to Launceston or as a space between Devonport or Cradle Mountain and Launceston.

Q3 Manage growth strategically

and understand the impact that multiple dwellings close together on the one block has on the character of the municipality. Provide better and multiple road access to the growing urban areas. Plan in conjunction with neighbouring councils a corridor for a Greater Launceston Ring Road before the land is developed.

Q4 I am easily accessible, most days residents can find me at the John Temple Gallery, 103 Meander Valley Road, Westbury.

Q5 I would prefer it if political parties were to keep out of Local Government.

MEANDER VALLEY'S much anticipated pump track on Alveston Drive in Deloraine was officially opened on Monday 19 September 2022.

Initiated by the Meander Valley Youth Committee and the Lions Club of Deloraine Inc., completion of the project has been greatly anticipated by the community and Council alike.

Designed and built by mountain biking champion Shaun O'Connor, the Meander Valley Pump Track is the first in Australia to be built using full GPS mapping. Pump tracks are specially designed with a sequence of loops and berms that enable riders to generate momentum and perform manoeuvres with minimal pedaling.


They are a great way to improve bike handling skills, balance, coordination and confidence before heading off to more challenging bike trails in Railton, the West Tamar or Derby.
